Preface

The most important event of the year 2005 was the re-accreditation of the Research Institute for Psychology & Health (P&H) in June by the Royal Academy for Arts and Sciences. The fact that P&H was re-accredited for another six years signifies the success over the past years and emphasizes its vitality in a period that was characterized by national discussion on the role of research institutes. All those who have worked with dedication to make P&H an important centre for research in the domain of psychology and health have to be complimented for this achievement. This applies particularly to the management and administrative staff of P&H.

After having served P&H as scientific director for five years, professor Wilmar Schaufeli resigned in September 2005. He made an important contribution to P&H by continuing its success as a vibrant, internationally oriented, high quality research institute that offers a greatly appreciated training facility for young scientists who are dedicated to psychological health research. P&H owes much to his leadership as well as to the work of Dr. Pascale Le Blanc, who served the past five years as Deputy Director and who decided to continue her job, for which we are very grateful. I would like to thank both Wilmar Schaufeli and Pascale Le Blanc for all the work they have done for P&H. It is an honour for me to take over the leadership of P&H as the successor of Wilmar Schaufeli and I consider it a challenge to maintain the excellent reputation of P&H. I look forward to doing this job in the next years together with Pascale Le Blanc and the rest of the smoothly working and highly professional team.

In 2005 there was one more major personnel change in a key position within the Research Institute. The Chairman of the Board, professor Guus van Heck, resigned for reasons of retirement. Together with Wilmar Schaufeli, he was the driving force in the second five years of P&H's existence. I would like to thank him for chairing the Board in this important period. From 2005 onwards, professor Robbert Sanderma from Groningen University will chair the Board and I am pleased with this competent and experienced successor.

Academic highlights in 2005 were the International Research Seminars on *Patients' emotions; what is their role in medical communication?*, *Depression and Quality of Life*, and on *Publishing your Papers*.

At the end of 2005, P&H included 82 Ph.D. candidates; 12 new Ph.D. projects were started and 18 were completed. In section 2.2. a brief summary of the completed projects is presented in order to give the reader a flavour of the type of projects that Ph.D. candidates of P&H conduct.

Looking back at the year 2005, we may conclude that it was a fruitful and productive year in which P&H demonstrated its vitality, even in a period that was characterized by discussion of the surplus value of research institutes over the newly introduced research master programs. P&H continued to be a dynamic and successful research institute that includes over one hundred members and 82 Ph.D. candidates, covering seven universities and two national institutes. Together they produced almost 288 English language scientific publications, which corresponds with an average of 7.7 per fulltime researcher. This represents a solid basis for continuation in the years that lied ahead.

1. ORGANIZATION AND MEMBERSHIP

1.1 Organizational structure

The Research Institute for Psychology & Health is an interuniversity Research Institute accredited by the Royal Dutch Academy of Arts and Sciences (KNAW) in accordance with the Dutch Law on Higher Education (WHW, art. 8.1, 923, and 9.55). It was founded on January 1, 1995. In conformity with the WHW and the criteria of the KNAW, the institute has discretion with respect to the development of its research and Ph.D.-training program, and the administration of personnel and material facilities.

The Research Institute for Psychology & Health was established on the basis of a collaborative initiative of the Universities of Utrecht (UU), Leiden (UL), and Tilburg (UvT), and the Dutch Institute for Primary Health Care (NIVEL), including researchers from the field of cognitive, developmental, clinical, health, social, and organizational psychology, and researchers attached to various medical departments. Since the founding in 1995, several other universities (faculties) have joined P&H on the basis of a formal working agreement: in 1997 the Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam (VU, Social and Cultural Sciences), in 1998 the University of Groningen (RUG, the Northern Center for Health Care Research), and, the University of Amsterdam (UvA-AMC, Medical Psychology of the University Hospital), in 2000 the Belgian universities of Leuven (Psychology and Pedagogy) and Ghent (Psychology and Pedagogy), and, the Vrije Universiteit Amsterdam (VU, Psychology), and finally, in 2002 the Helen Dowling Institute in Utrecht. Furthermore, P&H holds affiliate memberships with researchers of the Twente University of Technology (Psychology), and the University of Amsterdam (Social Sciences). In 2004, researchers of Nijmegen University (Medical Psychology) joined the research institute as affiliate members.

The 'penvoering' and secretariat of P&H are located at the Faculty of Social Sciences of Utrecht University.

The sections below summarize the main tasks and responsibilities of the board and committees of P&H, and provide information on their composition and activities in 2005. Tasks and responsibilities are further specified in the Institute's Regulations and Procedures.

1.2 Board

The board of P&H is responsible for the overall policy of the Research Institute. The board defines: the five yearly and annual research program; the training program for Ph.D.-candidates, including guidelines for the selection, acquisition, supervision and evaluation of Ph.D.- and postdoc-projects and candidates; membership criteria and guidelines for the admission of senior staff, as well as the annual budget plan (in consultation with the faculties participating). The scientific director participates in the meetings of the board with an advisory vote. The office manager is the board's secretary.

Main activities in 2005:

In 2005, the Board of P&H met on May 30. First, the state of affairs with respect to the application for reaccreditation of the Institute was discussed. The two questions that were posed by the ECOS/KNAW in reaction to the application were answered in writing by the Scientific Director. In addition, a delegation of Ph.D.-students and post-doc researchers was invited to exchange ideas on (the functioning of) the Institute with members of the ECOS/KNAW. Next, the future of the Research Institute – in connection with the introduction of the Research Masters - was discussed by the Board Members. The Board agreed with the nomination of the new Scientific Director who will succeed prof. dr. Wilmar Schaufeli in the fall of 2005, and with the suggested changes in the

composition of the Board, the Research Committee and the Training Committee, respectively. Finally, the proposed reduction of the membership fee for postdoc researchers was accepted by the Board.

1.3 Scientific director and staff

On behalf of the board, the Scientific Director is responsible for the effectuation of the Institute's policy and the day-to-day management. This includes: the planning and supervision of the effectuation of the research and training programs; the preparation of the five yearly research plan; the drafting of the annual budgets; the supervision of selection and evaluation procedures for Ph.D.- and postdoctoral projects and candidates; the development and effectuation of policy regarding publications; and the management and coordination of the Institute's contacts, activities, and public relations.

Scientific Director was prof. dr. Wilmar Schaufeli, who was succeeded as of September 2005 by prof.dr. Denise de Ridder, Professor of Health Psychology at the Faculty of Social Sciences of the Utrecht University. The Scientific Director was assisted by the Deputy Director Dr. Pascale Le Blanc. The Deputy Director supports the Scientific Director, particularly in matters relating to (the programming of) research and the coordination of the Ph.D.-training programme.

The management team was supported by administrative staff at the Faculty of Social Sciences of Utrecht University, consisting of Mrs. Lizet Hoekert-Korteweg (office manager) and Ms. Willemijn Corver (secretary).

1.4 Research Committee

In the coordination and effectuation of P&H's research policy, the Board and the Scientific Director are advised by the Research Committee. The major task of this committee is the selection and evaluation of research proposals for Ph.D.- and postdoc-projects. The Scientific Director participates in the meetings of this committee with an advisory vote, while the Deputy Director acts as its secretary.

Main activities in 2005:

In 2005, the Research Committee of P&H didn't meet as – due to a reorganization - there was no first flow funding available to appoint new Ph.D.-candidates at the Faculty of Social Sciences of Utrecht University. Therefore, the committee did not have to evaluate and select proposals for the annual allocation of first flow funding at Utrecht University. Nevertheless, as was the case in previous years, several new Ph.D.- and postdoc-projects and proposals from other P&H-locations and/or other sources of funding were evaluated by the members of the committee. During the year, the committee accepted the following projects as P&H-research:

In Area I, the following projects were accepted: 'Chronische en episodische psychologische determinanten van prognose bij chronisch hartfalen' developed by Prof. dr. J. Denollet, Dr. S. Pedersen & Dr. J. Maes (Leiden University), 'De rol van prototypen en bereidheid op gezondheidsbevorderend en belemmerend gedrag: Jongeren en (on)gezond eten' developed by Dr. R. Kuijjer, Dr.

J. de Wit & Prof. dr. D. de Ridder (Utrecht University), and ‘Do temporary temptations remind us of the long-term health goals we have?’ developed by Dr. C. Ouweland and Prof. dr. D. de Ridder (Utrecht University). In Area V, two post-doc projects entitled ‘Ouderlijke distress en empathische reacties op de pijn van hun kind: een evolutionair perspectief’ developed by Dr. L. Goubert and Prof. dr. G. Crombez (Ghent University), and ‘Stimulating self management in irritable bowel syndrome through web-based interactive technology’ developed by Prof. dr. J. Bensing & Dr. S. van Dulmen (NIVEL) were accepted. Moreover, the following Ph.D.-projects were accepted: ‘Diabetes educatie: belemmerende en bevorderende effecten van persoonlijke doelen en partnergedrag’ and ‘Depressieve gevoelens van partners van patiënten met een chronische aandoening’ both developed by Prof. dr. R. Sanderman & Dr. M. Hagedoorn (NCG/Groningen University), ‘Perceived control and well being in breast cancer patients’ developed by Prof. dr. R. Sanderman & Dr. A. Ranchor (NCG/Groningen University), ‘Understanding changes in quality of life in cancer patients: a cognitive interview approach’ developed by Prof. dr. M. Sprangers (University of Amsterdam), and ‘The experience, needs and coping strategies of parents caring at home for their child with cancer in the palliative phase and the way nurses support them’ developed by Prof. dr. M. Duijnste, Prof. dr. M. Grypdonck, Prof. dr. M. Verkerk & Dr. W. Ros (Utrecht University).

1.5 Training Committee

In the planning and evaluation of the Institute’s training program, the Board and the Scientific Director are advised by the Training Committee. The Scientific Director participates in the meetings of the committee with an advisory vote, while the Deputy Director acts as its secretary.

Main activities in 2005:

On December 15, 2005, the P&H Training Committee convened for its annual meeting. The agenda included the following items: the planned restructuring of the P&H Expert Groups, the planned restructuring of the P&H Core Module, and the presumed implications of the future, local Research Masters for the Ph.D.-training program of P&H. Regular issues on the agenda were the evaluations of the International Research Seminars in 2005, i.e. ‘Depression and Quality of life’ (February 24, 2005), ‘Longitudinal Research in (Occupational Health) Psychology’ (April 21 & 22, 2005) and ‘Publishing your papers’ (September 14 & 15, 2005), the P&H General Introduction, Core Module, and Ph.D. Research Seminar I, and the third P&H Day (January 20, 2005). In addition, the programmes of the upcoming, fourth P&H Day (January 26, 2006), and the state of affairs with respect to the Sixth Conference on Psychology & Health (May 2006) and two International Research Seminars that are planned for 2006 were discussed. The Ph.D.-training program for 2006 was approved.

1.6 Ph.D.-candidates Council

In matters concerning the training, counseling and supervision of Ph.D.-candidates, the Board and Scientific Director are advised by the Council of Ph.D.-candidates. The Council consists of members from the participating faculties and institutes and appoints from its midst one representative in the Board of P&H and three representatives in the Training Committee. On 31 December 2005, the council was represented by:

Main activities in 2005:

Throughout the year, the Ph.D.-council met regularly to discuss current issues and Ph.D.-affairs in general. As in previous years, the Ph.D.-council formally presented itself at the P&H General Introduction for new Ph.D.-candidates, recruited the organizing committee of the second P&H Day and wrote columns for the P&H Newsletter. Moreover, the council organized a survey among Ph.D.-candidates which formed the basis for a university lecturer's course on supervising Ph.D.-candidates. As part of the application for re-accreditation of P&H, the council members discussed the state of affairs regarding Ph.D.- training and -research with members of ECOS. Finally, the council discussed the consequences (for the current Ph.D.-program) of the new Research Masters in Psychology that will start in September 2005 at several Dutch universities, and how to prepare best for possible changes.

1.7 Research coordinators

The Board of the Research Institute for Psychology & Health appoints Coordinators for the five research areas. The Coordinators are responsible for the effectuation of P&H's research program and the specific development of this program in their respective area's. At the end of 2005 the Coordinators of the five area's were:

Area I: Neurocognition and Psychophysiology of Health:

However, due to changes in membership over the past years - most notably the out flux of some neurocognitive, developmental, and social psychological scientists to other research institutes – and the gradual growth of the school, a new structure consisting of Expert Groups was proposed by the scientific director that has been accepted by the board of P&H in 2003. The purpose of the Expert Groups is identical to that of the areas, as mentioned above. In addition, Expert Groups are meant to play a more prominent role in the Ph.D.-training program. The areas will remain intact as a purely administrative supra-structure. The potential negative effect on the cross-fertilization of these relatively small and homogeneous groups is counteracted by centrally orchestrated activities such as the bi-annual P&H conference, International Research Seminars, and Ph.D.-seminars. The nine Expert Groups are: Psychophysiology and health; Psychotrauma and grief; Suicide and psychopathology; Life span development; Work, stress and health; Health behavior models; Coping with illness; Patient-provider interaction; and Public mental health.

1.8 Membership

On December 31, 2005, 100 senior researchers and postdoctoral fellows (14 affiliate members, 3 pro memori, and 1 honorary member not included) were attached to the Research Institute for Psychology & Health, altogether bringing in 37.84 fte of research capacity. Table 1 presents data about the institutional affiliation of the P&H members.

1.10 Finance

Utrecht University and the Faculty of Social Sciences provided € 75.000 of P&H's annual budget. The universities, faculties and research institutes participating in Psychology & Health, including those at Utrecht, contributed € 45.307 in membership fees. With several minor bookings, total income summed up to € 127.254 in 2005.

Costs for personnel (Director and secretariat) totalled € 121.121, while material costs totalled (only) € 18.949, leaving a negative balance by the end of the year of € 12.816.

Payment of the first participation fees for the 2006 Rolduc conference, resulted in € 2.935 income on the conference account in the financial year 2005. On December 31, costs for the preparations for the next conference stood at € 397, making a positive balance on this special account of precisely € 2.538.

2. TRAINING

2.1 Ph.D.-candidates

In the course of 2005, 12 new Ph.D.-projects were started, four at Utrecht University, two at Leiden University, two at Groningen University, two at the University of Amsterdam, one at Tilburg University, and one at Vrije University Amsterdam.

On December 31, 2005, 82 Ph.D.-candidates were attached to the Research Institute for Psychology & Health. Table 2 presents information about their institutional affiliation. 2.5 Training program

The design of the P&H training program reflects the aim to offer a comprehensive, broad and internationally oriented program with a clear structure, but tailored as much as possible to the individual needs and expertise of the participants. The program thus offers a wide choice of optional modules in combination with a limited number of obligatory courses, including the General Introduction, the P&H Lecture series, the annual Seminar Ph.D.-Research I, the P&h Day, and the Core Module Introduction to Psychology and Health.

The P&H training program for Ph.D.-candidates is divided into five clusters (the minimum amount of hours to be spend between brackets):

- I. Orientation (160 hours)
- II. Domain specific theories (480 hours)
- III. Methodology and research techniques (240 hours)
- IV. General professional skills (160 hours)
- V. Individual supervision and counseling (400 hours)

Cluster I provides newly appointed Ph.D.-candidates with an orientation on recent scientific developments in the field of psychology and health. It also provides opportunities to get acquainted with fellow Ph.D.-candidates, senior researchers and their research projects. This cluster consists of the following components: the P&H General Introduction during the first year; the P&H Lecture Series throughout the project; the P&H Seminar Ph.D.-Research I at the end of the first year, and the P&h Day (the annual Ph.D. Conference) at the end of the second and third year.

Cluster II, on domain specific theories, aims to improve the student's insight into the specific domain of study and to learn to conceptually situate research questions. The cluster consists of the Core Module, International Research Seminars, and individual tutorials.

All Ph.D.-candidates are expected to participate in the five-day Core Module 'Introduction to Psychology and Health', in which senior researchers address themes in the field of psychology and health research. In 2005, this cluster included lectures and workshops on *Determinants of health behavior and strategies of change; Work, stress*

and health; Grief and bereavement; Depression and suicide; Communication and health care; Coping with chronic illness; Psychophysiology and Research Ethics.

Apart from the Core Module, Ph.D.-candidates are expected to participate in some of the International Research Seminars organized by P&H. In 2005, P&H hosted international research seminars on *Patients' emotions; what is their role in medical communication?*, led by Prof.dr. Hanneke de Haes en dr. Ellen Smets (University of Amsterdam), *Depression and Quality of Life*, led by prof.dr. Ad Vingerhoets (University of Tilburg) and on *Publishing your Papers*, led by dr. Ad Kaptein (Leiden University).

3. RESEARCH

3.1 Research mission

The research mission of the Research Institute for Psychology & Health (P&H) is “*the theory-guided study of psychological factors that influence health and illness and of the psychological consequences of somatic conditions*”. The P&H research program stands out, both nationally and internationally, by integrating three features: (1) health research is approached from a broad psychological perspective, incorporating biological, social, developmental, cognitive, and clinical psychology, (2) the majority of the researchers combine fundamental with applied research approaches, and (3) research focuses on mental as well as physical health.

Two psychological sources of health and illness have been identified in our program, namely psychosocial stress and patterns of health behavior. The scientific investigation of these sources of health-impairment or enhancement, and of the psychological and physiological processes by which they affect health, are main research topics of P&H.

3.2 Research areas

The research program is structured in five areas: I. ‘Neurocognition and Psychophysiology of Health’; II. ‘Critical Life Events and Mental Health’; III. ‘Work, Stress, and Health’; IV ‘Health Behavior: Determinants, Consequences, and Strategies of Change’ and V. ‘Psychological and Psychobiological Factors in Adaptation to Chronic Illness’. Members (senior, postdoctoral, and affiliate) are listed in the area they formally participate in. Senior members who also formally participate in a second area are listed as p.m. in that area.

I. Neurocognition and Psychophysiology of Health

This area unites members with a primary orientation on psychophysiology, psychonomics and neuropsychology, respectively. Its main focus, driven by the health psychology oriented members, is the study of the physiological interface between stress and emotions on the one hand and disease risk and course of diseases on the other hand. In particular the role of cortisol, cardiac autonomic function, respiratory functioning and immune parameters are being explored. Aspects of stress and emotions that are studied are: work related stress (Utrecht), the role of worrying (Leiden University) and the effects of emotional (non) expression (Utrecht University and Leiden University). On the effects side, the focus is specifically on rheumatoid arthritis, occupational burnout, chronic fatigue syndrome and medically unexplained syndromes (all at Utrecht University). The psychonomically and neuropsychologically oriented research of Area I focuses on fundamental research on brain and behavior, perception and perceptual systems, including attentive systems, with an eye for applied and health questions.

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II. Critical Life Events and Mental Health

This research area is concerned with the study of impact, processes of coping, and health outcomes concerning the exposure to major life events (e.g., loss, war, violence, migration, burns, changes related to stages of life e.g. childbirth or retirement). Studies are characterized by the emphasis on normal coping with major life events and the stagnation of these normal processes. Important issues are: healthy and unhealthy outcomes of responses to loss and trauma, basic psychological processes in adaptation to life events, determinants of disturbances in coping and health (including personality-characteristics and the social context), characteristics of psychopathology, related assessment procedures, and specific event-focused interventions. The studies include various age groups, not only adults but also children, adolescents and elderly. Both development of theory and application of acquired knowledge in prevention and clinical practice are essential in this area.

III. Work, Stress, and Health

The focus of the research program of Area III is on understanding the psychological processes underlying work-related stress and illness. On the one hand, current theories in the domain of Work & Organizational psychology are further refined and elaborated, whereas at the other hand, new theoretical models are being developed, thereby particularly drawing upon social psychology, personality psychology and psychophysiology. More particularly, phenomena like work pressure, job stress, burnout, absenteeism, psychosomatic complaints, turnover, and job dissatisfaction are conceived as unwanted outcomes of work behavior caused by detrimental working situations. Research in Area III focuses particularly – but not exclusively – on high risk occupational sectors (health care, education, law enforcement) and on high risk groups (female and aged workers). The research program includes a

variety of research methods, such as (longitudinal) field studies in different types of organizations, survey studies and experimental studies.

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IV. Health Behavior: Determinants, Consequences, and Strategies of Change

In industrialized countries, health-enhancing (e.g. exercising, eating a healthy diet) and health-impairing behavior patterns (e.g., smoking, alcohol abuse, overeating, sedentary lifestyle, sexual risk behavior) play an important role in preventing, or contributing to the development of chronic diseases such as CHD and cancers. It has been estimated, that even before the advent of AIDS, more than half of the premature mortality due to the leading causes of death was due to life-style factors and could have been prevented by adopting health-enhancing and/or abandoning health-impairing behaviors patterns. Thus, the focus of Area IV is on the primary prevention of illness through the study of the determinants of health behavior patterns and of strategies of change.

V. Psychological and Psychobiological Factors in Adaptation to Chronic Illness

This area is concerned with fundamental, strategic, and applied issues related to patient's adaptation to chronic somatic illness and the facilitating role of health care providers in this process. One focus of the research program lies on explaining adaptive efforts of chronically ill patients (adjustment to illness, change of health behaviors) in relation to coping resources and strategies, and quality of life. The emphasis lies on the role of goals and values as motivating devices in engaging in adaptive efforts. To that purpose, the stress-coping framework is broadened with notions from theories on self-regulation. Special attention is paid to the role of (limited) self-control and the way implementation intentions may help or hinder change of health behavior. Patients' illness cognitions are also a major concept in the theoretical and empirical work. It is studied how subjective health and symptom perception are related to negative emotional states and stress and to physiological responses. Attempts are made to explain the role of psycho-physiological mechanisms in bridging the gap between the psychological domain and the course of

symptomatology (in collaboration with Area I). Another focus of the program is aimed at disseminating psychological knowledge in the medical setting, and involves testing psychological techniques - aimed at adaptation to illness - in interventions delivered in medical settings, as well as observational and experimental studies on health provider's communication styles that either help or hinder patients in their adaptation process. Special attention is paid to communication styles that contribute to patients' involvement in the health care process, including taking more responsibility for their own health and healthy behaviors.

4. WORKPLAN 2006

The main challenge for the year 2006 will be the continuation of P&H's success, but now under the new leadership. The main aim is to consolidate P&H's position after professor Wilmar Schaufeli stepped down in 2005 as scientific director and professor Denise de Ridder took over his position. There has also been another major personnel change in 2005, i.e. the appointment of the new Chairman of the Board. Hence, in a way, in 2006 P&H will make a new start, at least as far as its management is concerned. This means that the new Scientific Director will have to develop her own ideas about the future of P&H and draft a policy document in which these ideas are laid down. This document will be discussed with the Board and serve as a policy guideline for the current re-accreditation period that runs until 2011.

A number of issues may need to be addressed in this period. One issue in particular is the Ph.D. training programme. Although this training programme has been evaluated by participants as outstanding, as are the International Research Seminars, it may be worthwhile to reconsider the format in which it is presented to Ph.D. students. For instance, it may be considered to what extent it is useful to allow for more personal choices in the Core Module of the training program in order to promote tailoring of the program to the specific research projects Ph.D.-students are engaged in. In addition, we will examine whether we can further improve the quality of the Core Module by providing an interactive format to maintain the high quality standards we aim for and to make the programme competitive with the training for Research Master students. Another issue that may need reconsideration is the role of the Research Institute as a network for senior P&H members. In the past years, a tremendous effort has been made to engage P&H members in so-called Expert Groups that provide an opportunity for scientific discussion in a specific area of research. The concept of Expert Groups is highly appreciated by the P&H members, in such a way that they have indicated that they would like more intensive discussion within these groups. In the next few years, we will therefore examine in what way P&H can offer an exciting academic arena for senior members as well.

Although basically, no fundamental changes are required in the policy of the Research Institute, the introduction of the Research Master programs challenge P&H, as well as other research institutes, to reconsider its mission, the kind of training it provides to Ph.D. students as well as its role as a platform for psychologists engaged in psychological health research: 2006 is the first year during which we will thoughtfully examine in what way P&H can meet the requirements for continuing to be – at least - as successful as it has been in the past and, no doubt, will continue to be in the future.
